**First Conditionals** 

#### Overview:

- "First Conditionals" is an Intermediate Grammar topic.

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#### What is a Conditional?

A conditional is a sentence that expresses a hypothetical situation and the likely outcome that would result if that situation were to occur.

# How many types of Conditionals do we have?

There are four main types of conditionals in English:

- Zero Conditionals
- First Conditionals
- Second Conditionals
- Third Conditionals

Note: Mixed conditionals are another type of conditional sentence in English that combine elements from different types of conditionals.

In this PDF, we will be learning the first conditionals only.

#### First Conditionals

First conditionals are a type of conditional sentences that express a possible or likely event or situation in the future, based on a certain condition in the present.

#### Examples:

- If you study hard, you will pass the exam.
- If it rains, we will stay indoors.
- If I have time, I will call you later.
- If you don't hurry, you will miss the bus.
- If she gets the job, she will move to a new city.
- If we finish early, we will have time to watch it.

#### Clauses in Conditionals

We have two clauses in conditional sentences.

- 1. **If Clause:** The clause which contains the word "if" and shows the condition (<u>also known as "conditional clause"</u>); The tense of the "if clause" is present simple in the first conditionals.
- 2. **Main Clause:** The clause which shows the results; The tense of the "main clause" is future simple in the first conditionals.

#### Structure

#### Let's have a review:

If clause (Present Simple)	Comma (,)	Main Clause (Future Simple)
If you study hard	,	You'll succeed.
Main Clause (Future Simple)	If clause (Present Simple)	
You'll succeed	If you study hard.	

# **Basic Examples**

- If I have time after work, I will go to the gym.
- We will stay indoors if it rains tomorrow.
- If you finish your homework tonight, you can watch TV.
- I will introduce myself if I see her at the party.
- If we leave now, we can make it to the movie on time.
- He will pass if he studies hard for the exam.
- If you come to the party, I will introduce you to my friends.

### The If Clause

Here is the list of words you can use instead of "if" in the if clause:

- Unless = If not
- On the condition that
- When
- Provided that
- In case
- Providing that
- As long as

#### The Main Clause

Here is the list of modals that we can use in the main clause:

- Shall: In some cases, "shall" can be used interchangeably with "will" to express a future action or outcome. For example, "If you come to the party, I shall introduce you to my friends."
- Could: It is used to express a possibility or hypothetical situation but with a greater degree of uncertainty than "might". For example, "If I work hard this year, I could get a promotion."
- **Should:** It can be used to express a likely outcome that is conditional on something else happening. For example, "If you study hard, you should pass the exam."
- Can: It expresses a likely outcome. For example, "If I leave work on time, I can make it to the concert."
- **Might:** It is used to express a possibility or likelihood of something happening, but with less certainty than "will". For example, "If I have time after work, I might go to the gym."

# Examples with alternatives

- In case you miss the train, call me and I'll pick you up.
- Should you need any help, feel free to ask me.
- Provided that it's not too expensive, I will buy the book.
- Unless you change your mind, we will meet at the restaurant tonight.
- As long as you are careful, you can try the new skateboard.
- If the weather holds up, we shall go on a picnic tomorrow.
- In the event that the flight is canceled, we will take the train.
- As soon as I finish my work, I will go for a walk.
- Should the flight be delayed, we will have to reschedule our meeting.
- In case you forget, I will remind you about the meeting tomorrow.

### Questions

We can ask questions with conditionals. We use WH questions and start our sentence with the main clause (after the WH)

#### For example:

- If you go to bed early tonight, what will you do with the extra time in the morning?
- What will we do if we get there in good time?
- What will you do if your son doesn't study well?
- What will the government do if we don't pay our taxes?

Note: It's more common to ask questions with second conditionals.

## **Imperatives**

We can make imperative sentences with the first conditionals. Instead of the if clause, we use imperative clauses.

#### Examples:

- If you want to pass your exams, study hard!
- If you don't want to get fired, get your act together and work!
- If you want to buy a new house, get a job!
- If you want to be a successful entrepreneur, take risks and pursue your ideas.
- If you want to reduce stress, practice mindfulness and relaxation techniques regularly.

Note: We **can** use an exclamation mark (!) in imperative sentences to emphasize that the speaker is giving orders to someone else

# **Advanced Tip**

We use the **present continuous tense** - "If you are working late tonight" - to describe a <u>temporary</u> or <u>ongoing situation</u>. On the other hand, we use the **future perfect tense** - "If you will have finished your work by then" - to describe a <u>hypothetical future situation</u> that will be completed before another future event.

# Examples

- 1. If it rains tonight, we will stay indoors and watch a movie.
- 2. If you study hard, you will pass the exam.
- 3. If we leave early, we can catch the next train.
- 4. If she is able to attend the meeting, she will provide an update on the project.
- 5. If they take our advice, they can avoid making the same mistake again.
- 6. If you eat too much, you will feel sick.
- 7. If I finish my work on time, I will leave the office early.
- 8. If he arrives on time, we can start the meeting without delay.
- 9. If you come to the party, I will introduce you to my friends.
- 10. If we don't book our tickets in advance, we might not get seats on the train.
- 11. If you win a million dollars, what is the first thing you would buy?
- 12. If you want to get over your fear of public speaking, practice in front of a mirror every day.
- 13. If you want to improve your fitness, start running three times a week.
- 14. If you want to pass the exam, study hard every day.
- 15. If you want to be a successful entrepreneur, take risks and pursue your ideas.
- 16. If you want to have a clean house, clean up a little each day.
- 17. If you want to avoid getting sick, wash your hands frequently and practice good hygiene.
- 18. If you want to master a new skill, practice it consistently every day.
- 19. If you want to be a better listener, actively engage in conversations and ask questions.
- 20. If you want to achieve your goals, set clear and specific action steps and work towards them every day.

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
