Tag Questions VS Direct Questions



Tag Questions

Tag questions are short phrases added to the end of a statement to turn it into a question. They seek confirmation or agreement.

NOTE: It's used to involve the listener in the conversation.

Examples

- You've seen that movie, haven't you?
- She's a great singer, isn't she?
- They don't like spicy food, do they?
- He won the competition, didn't he?
- We should leave now, shouldn't we?
- You've finished your homework, haven't you?
- She's been to Paris before, hasn't she?
- They won't be late, will they?
- He can speak French, can't he?
- Let's go, shall we?

Direct Questions

Direct questions are questions that are asked directly. We either use an auxiliary verb such as Do/Does/Did or we use WH- questions.

Examples:

- -Are you a doctor?
- -Where did you go?
- -Who is that man?

NOTE: We can also ask questions indirectly which is called Indirect Questions. <u>But in this PDF, we</u> will be comparing tag questions and direct questions.

Examples

- What time does the concert start?
- How long have you been studying English?
- Where did you go on your last vacation?
- Why did you choose that restaurant for dinner?
- Who is your favorite singer?
- When will buy a new car?
- How often do you exercise?
- How old are you?
- Where can I find a good coffee shop around here?
- Have you ever been to London?

The Difference?

Let's compare:

A. You are a doctor, aren't you?

B. Are you a doctor?

A implies that the speaker believes the person is a doctor and expects them to confirm it while B is a direct question asking about someone's profession. It seeks to know whether or not the person is a doctor.

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
