Present Perfect (Continuous)

Overview:

The **Present Perfect (Continuous)** is a fundamental grammar point that helps connect past actions to the present. @ By the end of this lesson, you'll be better able to use the **Present Perfect** fluently and naturally in daily conversations!

What is the Present Perfect? 😕

The **Present Perfect** is a **mix** of past and present. We use it when:

- An action that happened in the past but has a connection to now.
- The exact time is not important or not mentioned.

When Do We Use the Present Perfect? 177



- Life Experiences (Ever/Never)
 - Have you ever traveled abroad?
- I have never seen a ghost. 😮
- Recent Actions (Just/Already/Yet)
 - She has just finished her homework.
 - We have already eaten dinner. 🔲
 - He hasn't arrived yet. 🛚
- Actions Started in the Past & Still Happening (For/Since)

- I have lived here for ten years. 🏡
- She has worked here since 2020.
- Multiple Actions Over Time (So far/Up to now)
 - I have read three books this month.
 - He has visited many countries.

How to Form the Present Perfect? **

- Positive: Subject + have/has + past participle (P.P)
 - **I have visited** Paris.
- She has studied English for years.
- Negative: Subject + have/has + not + past participle (P.P)
 - X | haven't eaten sushi before.
- X He hasn't finished his work yet.
- Questions: Have/Has + subject + past participle (P.P)?
 - ? Have you ever tried skydiving?
 - ? Has she called you today?

Present Perfect vs. Past Simple 🐾

Present Perfect	Past Simple
I have lost my keys. (Still lost)	I lost my keys yesterday. (Finished)
She has lived here for 5 years. (Still lives here)	She lived here for 5 years. (Not anymore)
Have you ever been to Spain?	Did you go to Spain last summer?

◆ **Key Difference:** If you mention a **specific time**, use **Past Simple**! If you don't, use Present Perfect.

Present Perfect Continuous X

The Present Perfect Continuous (also called the Present Perfect Progressive) is used to describe actions that started in the past and are still continuing now or recently stopped with visible effects.



Mhen Do We Use the Present Perfect

Continuous?

Actions Started in the Past & Still Happening Now

- I have been reading this book for two hours.
- They have been living in London since 2010. 👪
- She has been learning Spanish for six months. 🛼

FOR vs. SINCE:

- ✓ For + a period of time (2 hours, 3 weeks, 10 years).
- Since + a specific point in time (yesterday, Monday, 2005)

Actions That Recently Stopped & Have Present Effects

- I am tired because I have been running.
- He is sweating because he has been playing soccer.
- You look sleepy! Have you been working all night?

Repeated Actions Over Time

- She has been calling me all day.
- The company has been losing money for months. 📉

How to Form the Present Perfect Continuous? **



Structure:

✓ Affirmative:

Subject + have/has + been + verb (-ing)

- I have been studying English for two years.
- She has been working since morning.

X Negative:

Subject + have/has + not + been + verb (-ing)

- I haven't been sleeping well lately.
- He hasn't been feeling well since yesterday.

? Questions:

Have/Has + subject + been + verb (-ing)?

- Have you been exercising regularly?
- Has she been learning French?

Present Perfect vs. Present Perfect Continuous X



Present Perfect	Present Perfect Continuous
Focus on the result	Focus on the duration
I have written three articles. 🗾	I have been writing articles all day. 📘
She has painted the house. ::	She has been painting the house for 5 hours. Q
They have worked here since 2010.	They have been working here since 2010.

- Golden Rules:
- ✓ Use Present Perfect when the <u>result</u> is more important.
- Use Present Perfect Continuous when the process/duration is more important.

📌 Common Mistakes 🚶

Name of the local Name of the

- \times I have went to the mall.
- X She has lived here since 10 years.
- X Did you ever see that movie?

✓ Correct:

✓ I have **gone** to the mall.

- ✓ She has lived here for 10 years.
- ✓ Have you ever seen that movie?

X Wrong:

- I have been knowing him for years. (KNOW is a stative verb)
- She **has been being** late every day. **(Set doesn't take Continuous)**
- They have been finished their project. (Use 'have finished' instead)

Correct:

- I have known him for years.
- She has been arriving late every day.
- They have finished their project.

1. The "This is the first time" Structure

- This is the first time I have driven a car.
- That's the best meal I have ever eaten!

2. The "It's Been" Structure

- It's been a long time since we last met. 🕰
- It has been years since I played basketball. ##

3. Mixed Time Situations

- He has always wanted to be a pilot. (From the past until now
- They have never spoken to each other, but they will meet tomorrow.

4. Stative Verbs in Present Perfect

- 🤋 Some verbs don't usually take -ing forms in Present Perfect Continuous!
- X I have been knowing her for years. (WRONG X)
- 🗸 I have known her for years. (CORRECT 🗸)

🔥 1. Using "Lately" & "Recently"

We often use lately or recently with Present Perfect Continuous.

- ✓ I have been feeling really tired lately.
- ✓ She has been working a lot recently.
- 🔥 2. Stative Verbs Don't Work in Present Perfect Continuous

Some verbs (called **stative verbs**) describe states, not actions. These do **not** usually take -ING.

- X I have been knowing her for years. (WRONG)
- ✓ I have known her for years. (RIGHT)

Here are some stative verbs that DO NOT take the Present Perfect Continuous:

- know, believe, understand, remember, hate, love, like, want, seem, own, belong
- 🔥 3. Using Present Perfect Continuous for Temporary Actions

When something is temporary, we often use Present Perfect Continuous:

- ✓ I have been staying with my friend this week.
- ✓ She has been working at a café until she finds a better job.
- 4. When Present Perfect and Present Perfect Continuous Mean the Same
- With "live," "work," "study," "teach", both tenses are often interchangeable:
- ✓ I have lived here for 5 years.
- ✓ I have been living here for 5 years.
- (No major difference!)
